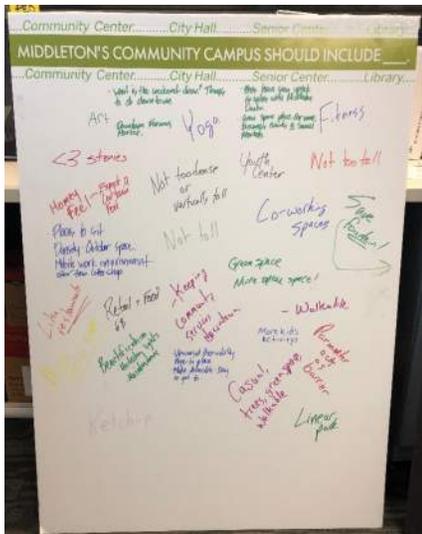

## LIBRARY NEEDS / IMPROVEMENTS

- *ADA and Universal Design principles throughout*
- *2016 Study accurately describes needs and trends (staff, visitors, materials, programs, etc.)*
- *Downtown location*
- *Welcoming, community-oriented*
- *Space for printed materials is critical – not replaced by technology*
- *Colocation, multi-function, multiuse, flexible*
- *Could mix with city services, café, shops, arts, post office, indoor recreation, maker space, etc. – Share w/community Center?*
- *Meeting rooms, 10-20 ppl. very popular (Community Center function?)*
- *Flexible (dividable) meeting space for public uses (500+/- ppl)*
- *Media / technology services*
- *Outdoor seating and meeting spaces (at grade or terrace/rooftop)*
- *Plaza, gardens (at grade or terrace/rooftop)*
- *Public art*
- *Transit and parking access (shared parking)*
- *Bike friendly – secure, sheltered parking*
- *Dokk 1 in Denmark is a great example of colocation*



## CITY HALL NEEDS / IMPROVEMENTS

- *ADA and Universal Design principles throughout*
- *Downtown location*
- *Welcoming, visitor/customer-friendly lobby/public space w/ wayfinding, service counters, seating*
- *Security, safety, monitoring, etc. seamlessly integrated*
- *Staff offices, work areas, meeting rooms, break/lunch room,*
- *Modern office equipment, technology and communications*
- *Storage space, files, etc.*
- *Could stack uses on multiple levels: visitor/customer at ground, officials and staff above*
- *Logical hierarchy of accessible connections with other uses and facilities*
- *Council chambers w/ large seating/meeting space*
- *Multi-purpose room – share w/ Library, Community Center?*
- *Share parking*
- *Transit, bike, walk, drive prioritization*
- *Access (visual, physical) to daylight, plantings, public art*
- *Promote health and wellness: office equip, furnishings, activities, programs*
- *Adequate maintenance space for equip., products, etc.*



## SENIOR CENTER NEEDS / IMPROVEMENTS

- *Apply ADA / Universal Design principles throughout*
- *Dementia / Alzheimer compatible (legible, dedicated, safe, secure, etc.)*
- *Improved visitor/user traffic flow, provide corridors, wayfinding*
- *Variety of rooms: staff offices, private meetings, expandable public, quiet sitting, etc.*
- *Good acoustics - noise abatement/control*
- *Storage and maintenance equip./ material on each floor*
- *More restrooms*
- *Modernized HV/AC system*
- *Convenient drop off, transit and parking access*
- *Commercial kitchen – could share with other facilities, programs*
- *Demand for services, programs, events is increasing*
- *Sr. programs don't mix / share well with other users*
- *Certification, licensing responsive*

- *Multipurpose / flex space share w/ Library, City Hall?*
- *Share facilities and features w/ library: kitchen, tools /maker equip., AV/technology, computers, etc.*
- *Spaces shared w/ Sr.'s to be exclusive / separate during Sr. use*

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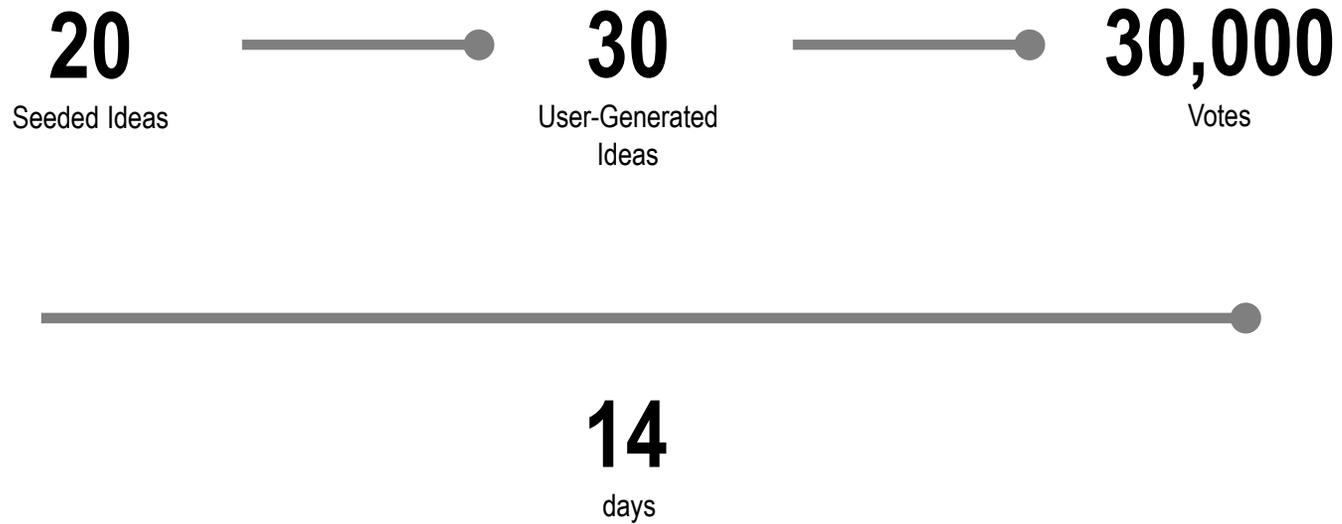

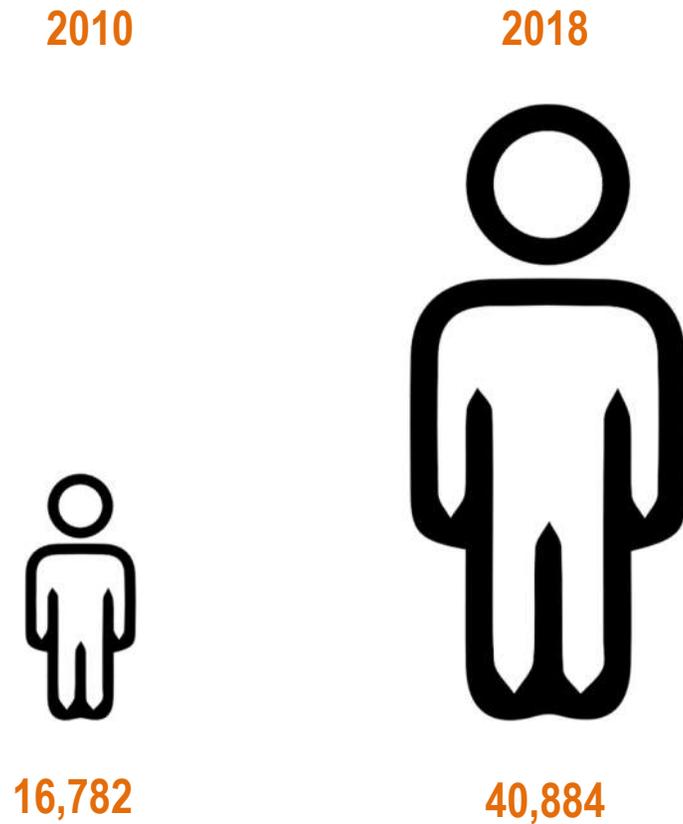

## Library Utilization – Total Program Participation

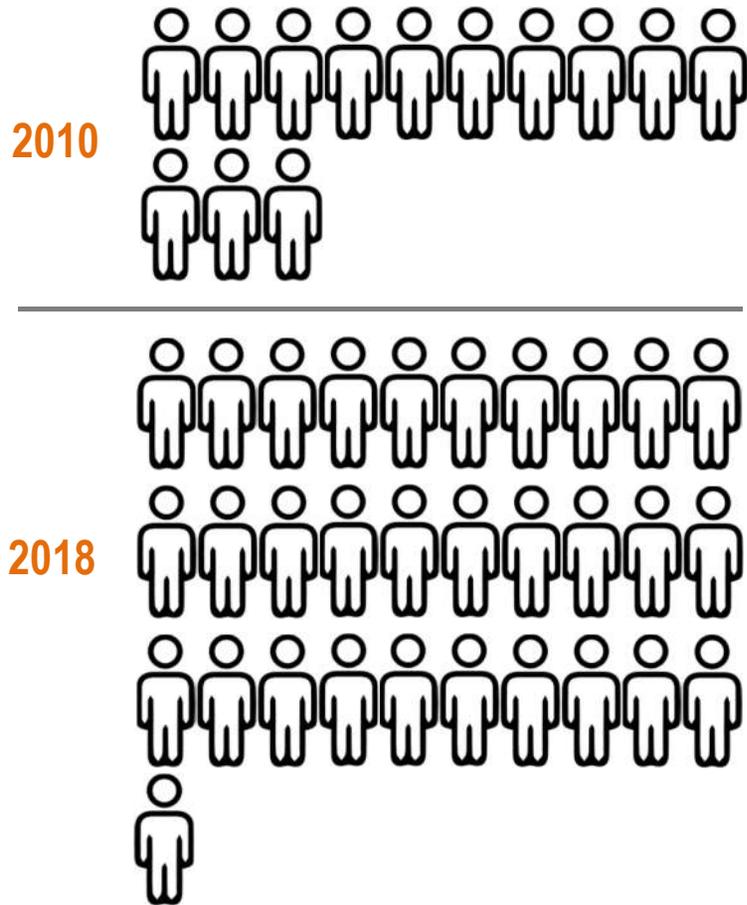


Total participation in library programs has also increased nearly **2.5 times** since 2010.

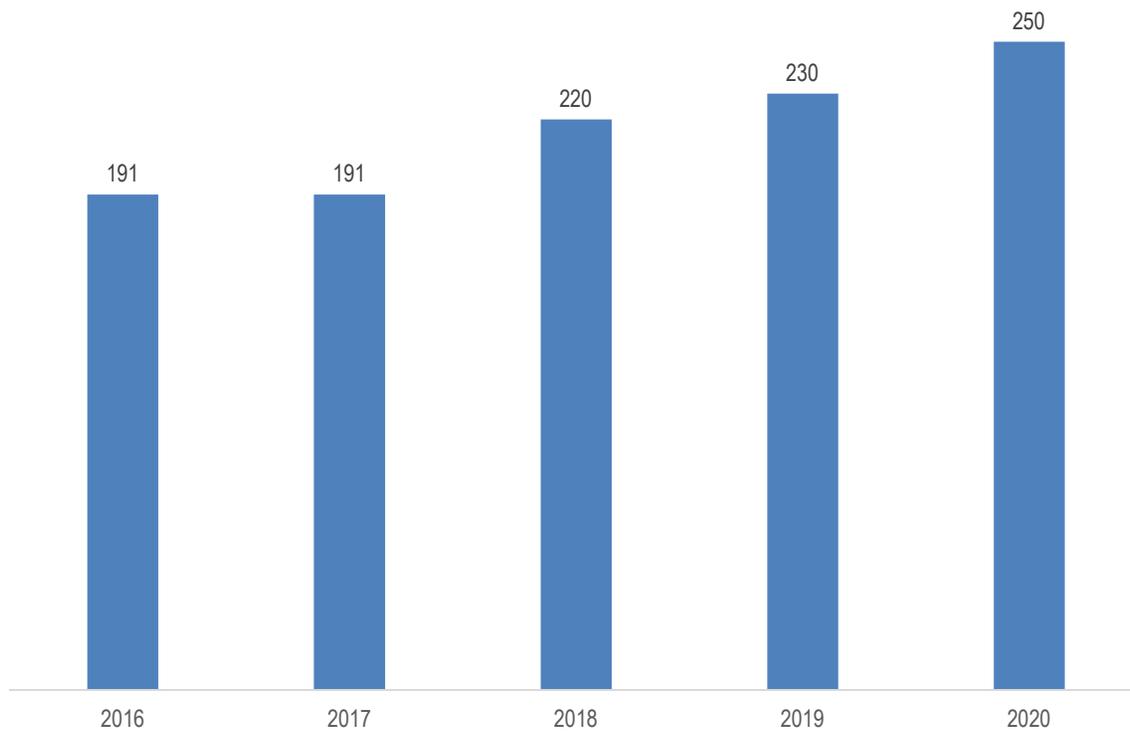

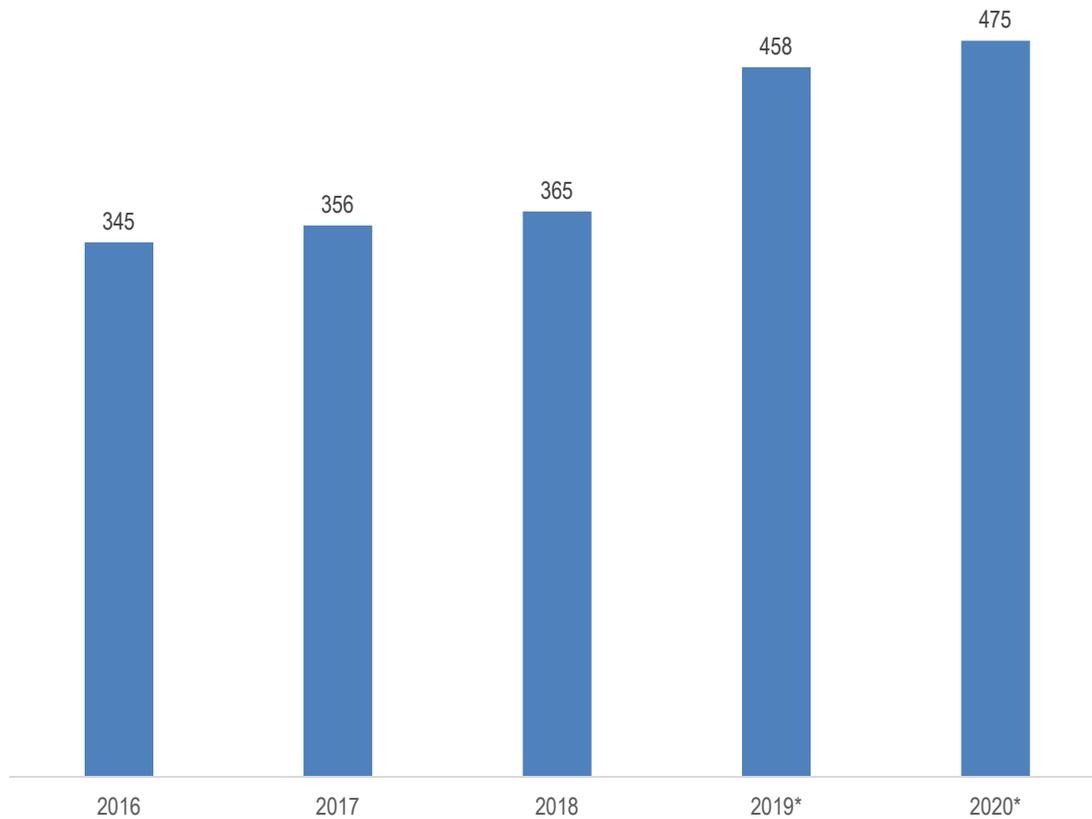
## Senior Center – Average Daily Participation

*Provide hands-on, small group activities for participants to explore / discuss ideas and provide input to the planning team:*

- 1. Building massing explorations with foam core blocks and aerial maps at site and individual building scales*
- 2. Review and comment on elements of building design: exterior appearance, materials, interior features, mix of uses, etc, using curated photo sheets*
- 3. Reimagining Hubbard Ave.: use scale model "kit of parts" to assemble, document and discuss options from pedestrian plaza to flex-street*
- 4. Sim-Community Campus: selecting and placing photos of potential project elements on aerial maps*
